Joan Henneberry, executive director of the Department of Health Care Policy and Financing in Colorado, leads the agency responsible for managing public health insurance programs including Medicaid and CHIP. She is a senior health policy advisor to the governor, developing and implementing health reform policies and initiatives. Christopher G. Atchison is associate dean for public health practice, director of the University of Iowa Hygienic Laboratory, and clinical professor in Health Management and Policy at the University of Iowa, College of Public Health. He is also the principal investigator of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention–funded Upper Midwest Public Health Preparedness Center and an investigator in the area of Community Engagement for the University of Iowa’s Clinical Translation Science Award.

Prior to joining the University in 1999, Mr. Atchison served for eight years as director of the Iowa Department of Public Health. During his tenure, he was elected to be the inaugural chair of the Iowa Child Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP) Board. He also chaired the Iowa Health Data Commission and the Governor’s Task Force on Regulatory Reform. He was vice-chair of Healthy Iowans 2000 and 2010, the Long Term Care Coordinating Council, and was a member of the Governor’s Health Care Reform Task Force and the Iowa Empowerment Board.

At the national level, Mr. Atchison served as president of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO) during the years 1994 and 1995 and was chair of the Joint Council of Official Health Agencies. In 1998 he received ASTHO’s Arthur T. McCormack Award for his

contributions to public health practice. He has been on the board of the Public Health Foundation and was a member of the New York Academy of Medicine's Committee on Medicine and Public Health. He currently serves as the co-chair of Iowa's Partnership for Better Health and is on the Steering Committee for the National Academy of State Health Policy.

Anthony Rodgers is director of the Arizona Medicaid and CHIP programs, known as the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System. Prior to being appointed to this position, he was general manager of State-Sponsored Programs for Wellpoint Health Networks, responsible for Medicaid and CHIP product lines and State-Sponsored Programs' health plan operations. Earlier, Mr. Rodgers served as chief executive officer of L.A. Care Health Plan. L.A. Care grew to over 600,000 members under his leadership, making it the largest public health plan in the United States.
